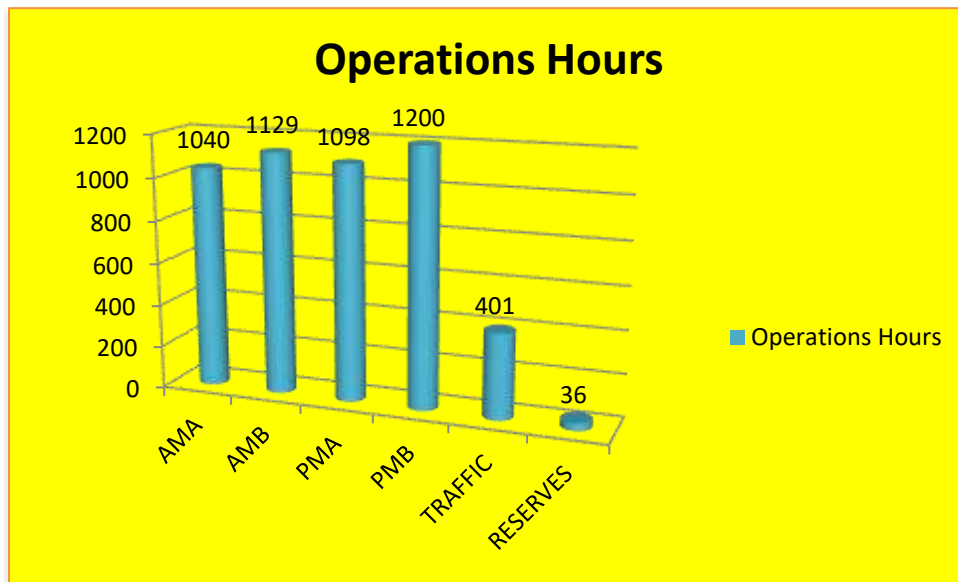

### Hours

During the month of July, officers of the Operations Division worked a total of 4,868 hours. 36 total work hours were completed by Non-Probationary Reserve Officers not in the FTO program.

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## **Highlights**

On July 1<sup>st</sup>, Officer Cody Molina began to follow a vehicle and observed it to exit the Interstate and pull onto the shoulder of Ronald Reagan Parkway. The driver exited the vehicle and changed places with passenger. Officer Molina and Cpl. David Shedrow stopped to check the welfare of the occupants. The driver, who was now a passenger, provided deceptive identification, which could not be verified. The driver also showed signs of impairment. Cpl. Shedrow deployed his police K9 around the vehicle. The K9 showed positive indication of narcotics in the vehicle. A search revealed the driver's identification in the vehicle and officers learned that the driver had three active warrants. Additionally, the driver was administered sobriety testing and failed all testing. The driver admitted to using heroin earlier in the day and possessed suspected heroin. The driver consented to a certified test in the form of a blood draw and was transported to a medical facility where the draw was administered. Upon completion, the driver was charged and transported to jail.

On July 2<sup>nd</sup>, Cpl. David Shedrow initiated a traffic stop for an infraction. Upon making contact and identifying the occupants, Cpl. Shedrow detected the odor of marijuana emanating from the vehicle. Cpl. Shedrow requested the driver to exit the vehicle due observations. The driver refused multiple times and had to be physically removed from the vehicle. Officers continued attempts to restrain the driver while the driver made attempts to re-enter the vehicle. Officers eventually gained control and placed handcuffs on the driver. Two pounds of suspected marijuana and two firearms were located in the vehicle, one of which was reported stolen. The driver and passenger were charged and transported to jail.

On July 5<sup>th</sup>, Officer Taylor Adamson initiated a traffic stop on a vehicle that was operating on a flat tire. Upon making contact, Officer Adamson observed signs of impairment about the driver. Officer Adamson had the driver exit the vehicle due to the driver admitting that he should not be driving. Officer Adamson detected the odor of alcohol about the driver and asked if the driver would perform sobriety testing. The driver was reluctant and argumentative with Officer Adamson about performing sobriety testing. The driver was transported to the Brownsburg Police Department where a blood draw warrant was requested and obtained from a judge. The driver was transported to a medical facility where the draw was administered. Upon completion, the driver was charged and transported to jail.

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On July 5<sup>th</sup>, Officer Cody Molina initiated a traffic stop on a suspected impaired driver. Upon contact with the driver, Officer Molina observed signs of impairment, possibly from narcotics. Cpl. David Shedrow assisted with the stop and deployed his police K9 around the vehicle. The K9 showed positive indication of narcotics in the vehicle. The search yielded no narcotics but officers observed alcohol containers and information providing the driver's true identity. Investigation revealed the driver had multiple active warrants out of Marion County. Officer Molina requested and obtained a blood draw warrant and the driver was transported to a medical facility where a blood draw was administered. Upon completion, the driver was charged and transported to jail. It should be noted that further investigation revealed that the driver was in possession of stolen tools reported out of Indianapolis.

On July 9<sup>th</sup>, Officer Jason Umbanhowar responded to 1100 Columbia Circle regarding a stolen vehicle. It was reported that the vehicle was left unlocked during the evening of July 9<sup>th</sup> and a purse was left in the vehicle. On July 11<sup>th</sup> the vehicle was located in a parking spot unoccupied in an apartment complex on Bentwood Circle in Indianapolis. No suspect information was provided at the time of report or recovery.

On July 12<sup>th</sup>, PMB shift officers responded to a crash at a business on North Green Street. Upon contact with the driver, officers observed signs of impairment and detected the odor of alcohol about the driver. Officer Elsiana Crosby administered sobriety testing to the driver. The driver failed two of three tests and consented to a certified breath test. The driver was transported to the Brownsburg Police Department where the test was administered. Results of the test exceeded the legal limit. The driver was charged and transported to jail. No injuries were reported in the crash.

On July 21<sup>st</sup>, Officer Lucio Argueta initiated a traffic stop on a suspected impaired driver. Officer Argueta recognized the driver from a previous encounter earlier in his shift. Officer Argueta detected the odor of alcohol about the driver and administered sobriety testing. The driver failed one of three tests and consented to a certified breath test. Results of the exceeded the legal limit. The driver was charged and transported to jail.

On July 23<sup>rd</sup>, Officer Lucio Argueta initiated a traffic stop for an infraction. Upon making contact with the vehicle occupants, Officer Argueta smelled the odor of marijuana emanating from the vehicle. Cpl. David Shedrow assisted with the stop and deployed his police K9 around the vehicle. The K9 showed positive indication of narcotics in the vehicle. A search revealed suspected marijuana and drug paraphernalia. Additionally, it was learned that a passenger was wanted on a felony warrant out of Hendricks County. The passenger was transported to jail on the warrant and the driver was charged for narcotic possession.

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On July 25<sup>th</sup>, Officer Chris Jones responded to a report of a person consuming alcohol inside a vehicle at a local business. Upon arrival, Officer Jones located the person who had parked their vehicle, taking two parking spaces. Officer Jones observed signs of impairment and smelled the odor of alcohol about the person. The person admitted to consuming alcohol at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway all day and had been driving to the business in Brownsburg. Officer Jones was unable to administer sobriety testing due to the drivers impairment. The driver consented to a certified test in the form of a blood draw and was transported to a medical facility where the draw was administered. Upon completion, the driver was charged and transported to jail.

On July 30<sup>th</sup>, Officer Megan Clonce responded to a missing person report on Brookview Drive. On arrival, Officer Clonce spoke with family who advised their mother was suicidal and that a firearm and ammunition were missing from gun safe. Officer Clonce was able to utilize law enforcement resources in attempt to locate the mother. The mother was suspected to be in the Terre Haute area at an apartment. Officers requested Terre Haute Police to check the area. The mother was located and was in possession of firearms. Police then transported the mother to a medical facility for evaluation.

On July 31<sup>st</sup>, Officer Taylor Adamson initiated a traffic stop on a suspected suspended driver. The driver continued without stopping, then pulled into a gas station. Upon contact, the driver admitted to having a suspended license. Officer Heather Foote assisted with the stop and deployed her police K9 around the vehicle. The K9 showed positive indication of narcotics in the vehicle. A search revealed suspected marijuana. Further investigation revealed that the driver possessed suspected methamphetamine. The driver was charged and transported to jail.

Megan Clonce was selected as the new K9 handler and will be going through the process of training with a new K9 and being issued all of the pertinent equipment for the task.

Officer Dave Marcum is on medical leave and expected for return to full duty in November.

Three new officers began field training during the month of July. All were laterals, however, two will be completing the Experience Officer Phase and one will complete the entire training program. Officer Chris Jones has successfully completed the Experienced Officer Phase, has been released for solo patrol, and is assigned to AMA shift. Officer McAloon is midway through the Experienced Officer Phase and is expected for completion mid-August. Officer Ettenberger has nearly completed Phase 1 and is expected to advance to Phase 2 in the coming weeks.

The Field Training Program had one vacancy due to the resignation of Officer Jacob Ward. Officer Elsiana Crosby was chosen to fill the vacancy and will be attending FTO School August 4<sup>th</sup> to August 6<sup>th</sup>.

BPD will be taking letters of intent for officers who have interest in being Field Training Officers due to potential vacancies within the program. Cpt. Jeff Klayer and Major Bryan Fultz will be meeting with those who have interest during the month of August.

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## **Use of Force**

The Brownsburg Police Department documented nine (9) Use of Force Reports during the month of July. The reports are classified as follows: Weaponless Physical and Firearm Pointing.

Documented reports 1-3 involved Brownsburg Officers requesting a driver to exit a vehicle due to a narcotics investigation. The driver was not cooperative and refused to exit the vehicle after several commands. Officers had to physically remove the driver from the vehicle while the driver continued to resist and attempted to get back in the vehicle. Officers eventually gained control and placed handcuffs on the driver. It was learned that the driver had two firearms within reach just inside the vehicle, one of which was stolen. The driver was charged and transported to jail.

Documented report 4 involved a Brownsburg Officer responding to a person suffering from a mental health crisis. The officer attempted to handcuff the person for an emergency detention. The person passively resisted and the officer had to mildly apply additional force in order to restrain the person. The person was transported to a medical facility for evaluation.

Documented reports 5-8 involved Brownsburg Officers attempting to deploy on a “high risk” traffic stop at the conclusion of a vehicle pursuit on a stolen vehicle. Officers pointed their department issued firearms until the driver was taken into custody.

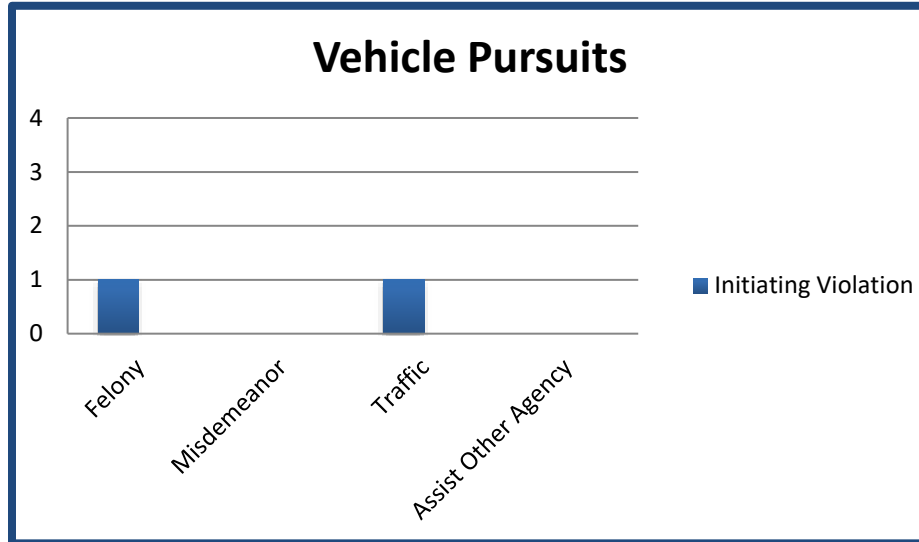
Documented report 9 involved Brownsburg Officers responding to an abandoned structure regarding potential “squatters”. The structure had an outbuilding that was unsecured. The officer drew his department issued firearm prior to entering and made announcements prior to entering. An unknown person announced they would be coming outside. The officer pointed his department issued firearm at the person until they were taken into custody. The person was charged and transported to jail.



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## Vehicle Pursuit

The Brownsburg Police Department documented two (2) Vehicle Pursuit Reports during the month of July. The chart below lists the initiating violation(s):



Pursuit 1 was initiated by Brownsburg Police Department after officers located a stolen vehicle in Brownsburg. The pursuit traveled north just inside Boone County where the vehicle stopped shortly after striking the three vehicles. The driver was taken into custody without further incident. The three vehicles that were struck received minor damage and no injuries were reported. No damage was reported to police vehicles.

Pursuit 2 was initiated by Brownsburg Police Department for a traffic offense. The vehicle fled at a high rate of speed when the officer activated emergency lighting. The officer terminated the pursuit due to losing sight of the vehicle due to high rates of speed. Officers are following up on leads of a possible suspect that was driving the vehicle at the time of the pursuit.

Pursuit distances were 6 to 10 miles lasting 5 minutes. No crashes or damage to department vehicles were reported.

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## **Traffic**

The Traffic Unit responded to the following workflow complaint(s) during July:

- Parking violation on Prelude Road-Vehicle was tagged
- Stop sign and speeding violations at Locust Lane and Williams Drive

The traffic Units worked the Fourth of July parade and the evening for the fireworks display. Cpl. Rooker assisted with maintaining safety at an intersection. Cpl. Dan Brinson rode one of the Traffic motorcycles to lead the parade with Officer Huntsman.

All three Traffic Units worked the evening of the fireworks at the intersection of Lucas Lane and North Green Street. The traffic pattern for egress vehicle and pedestrian traffic was set up and executed to get all the spectators out of the park safely.

On July 25<sup>th</sup>, the three Traffic Units worked at Lucas Oil Raceway Indianapolis for the NASCAR Truck race. The traffic pattern executed allowed traffic to flow in and out of the event safely and efficiently. The three traffic units staffed the front entrance of Lucas Oil Raceway from 11am to 12:30am making the spectator traffic ingress and egress a success.

Officer Huntsman and Officer Kalyuzhny completed active shooter training on July 8<sup>th</sup>.

Cpl. Rooker and Officer Huntsman completed Standardized Field Sobriety Testing (SFST) refresher training on July 16<sup>th</sup>.

All Traffic Units attended mandatory department search and seizure training. The department responded to and completed 66 vehicle crashes during the month of July. The Traffic Unit completed 21 of those crashes.

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## **Narcotics**

On July 10<sup>th</sup>, BNU Officers learned of a stolen vehicle that was parked in an apartment complex in Brownsburg. BNU Officers set up surveillance on the vehicle and observed a subject leave the apartments and get into the stolen car. BNU Officers converged on the vehicle and attempted to box in the stolen car but the subject drove the car over the sidewalk and fled. A short vehicle pursuit ensued but after a short time, ended and the subject was taken into custody without further incident and the stolen car was recovered.

Throughout the month of July, BNU Officers were able to utilize investigative skills to recover another stolen vehicle and round up more wanted suspects in the Indianapolis area. Also, BNU Officers were in contact with an agency in Wisconsin who has been able to recover nearly \$100,000.00 worth of stolen heavy equipment stemming from a BNU investigation over 3 states starting in March 2025, (See March 2025 BNU Monthly Report).

## **Emergency Response Team**

### **Training:**

- **July 22** – ERT conducted Patrol Rifle Training at the Lebanon Police Department Range. All team members successfully zeroed and qualified with their issued patrol rifles. Following the range session, ERT transitioned to the BPD Training Facility to conduct Close Quarters Tactics (CQT) training. This session focused on fundamentals of entry, variable threshold assessments, hallway mitigation, and structure clearance.
- **July 27** – ERT held additional CQT training at the Brownsburg Training Facility, utilizing the shoot house. Training emphasized breach point tactics, threat mitigation, force-on-force scenarios, and full structure clearance operations.

### **Deployments:**

- The Emergency Response Team was not deployed during the month of July.

### **Team Status:**

- All ERT members remain in active status.

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## Community Engagement

From June 28<sup>th</sup> to July 4<sup>th</sup>, officers from the Brownsburg Police Department participated heavily in Community Engagement while on patrol during the Extravaganza. With the Carnival, Parade and Fireworks display, there were several opportunities for officers to interact and have several conversations with numerous citizens.

On July 10<sup>th</sup>, Captain Bullock and Executive Assistant Kellie Cummins participated in a Touch a Truck event at The Learning Center preschool. Preschoolers were allowed to meet and greet as well as take photos alongside the departments APC.

On July 14<sup>th</sup>, Captain Pat Bullock attended a “Youth Mental Health” seminar hosted by the “Hendricks County Health Partnership” at the Royal Theater in Danville. This seminar provided some insight on statistics and history for mental health particularly for our younger generation and some programs that are able to help.



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**Reserves**

Reserve Officers provided 36 hours of shift coverage during the month of July. Additionally, Reserve Officers provided nearly 30 hours of parade and park coverage events during July.
