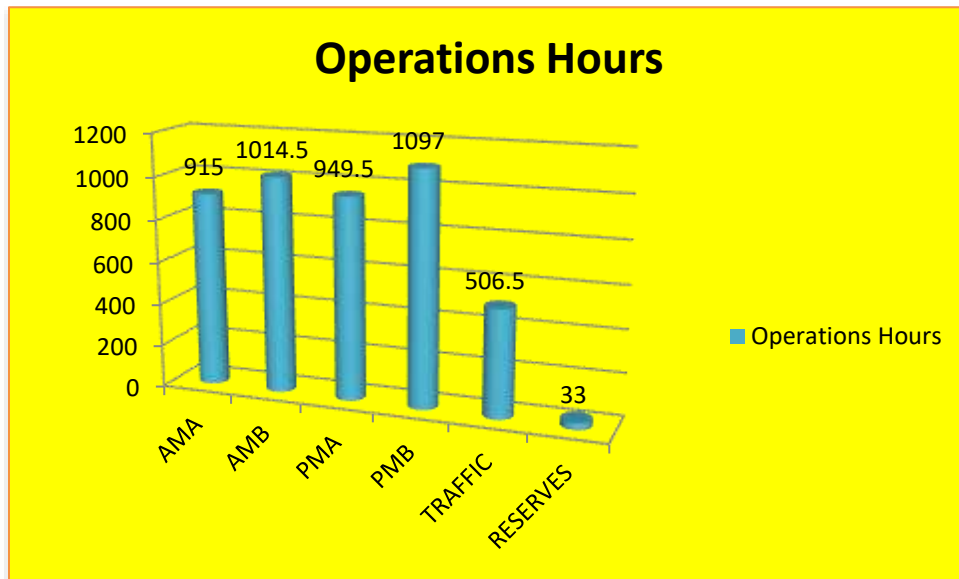

### Hours

During the month of September, officers of the Operations Division worked a total of 4,482.5 hours. 33 total work hours were completed by Non-Probationary Reserve Officers not in the FTO program.

## **Highlights**

On September 1<sup>st</sup>, Officer Callahan Baxter responded to a report of fraud at a local hotel. The reporting party resided out of state and received a notification of fraudulent charges. Officer Baxter obtained possible suspect information and made contact with the suspect(s) who had utilized a bank account to purchase the room. The suspect provided deceptive identification and was taken into custody for multiple warrants once the true identity was found. Further investigation revealed the suspect possessed suspected cocaine, marijuana, narcotics without a valid prescription, and 3 debit cards. A second suspect was charged for fraud. Both suspect were transported to jail.

On September 2<sup>nd</sup>, Officer Callahan Baxter initiated a traffic stop on a suspected impaired driver. Upon contact, Officer Baxter observed signs of impairment and detected the odor of alcohol about the driver. The driver was uncooperative and would not participate in sobriety testing. Due to level of intoxication, a blood draw warrant was requested and obtained from a judge. The driver was transported to a medical facility where the draw was administered. Upon completion, the driver was charged and transported to jail. An inventory of the vehicle revealed multiple containers of alcohol.

On September 3<sup>rd</sup>, Brownsburg officers responded to two residences where theft from vehicles had taken place. Wallets containing cash, a hunting bow, and miscellaneous items were stolen from the vehicles. Video surveillance has been provided of one incident. It should be noted that the residences are not in close proximity.

On September 8<sup>th</sup>, PMB shift officers responded to a disabled vehicle on a curb. On arrival, officers located a vehicle that was stuck on a curb. Upon contact with the driver, Officer Callahan Baxter observed signs of impairment. The driver consented to sobriety testing. The driver failed all testing and consented to a certified breath test. The driver was transported to the Brownsburg Police Department where the test was administered. Results of the test exceeded the legal limit. The driver was charged and transported to jail.

On September 9<sup>th</sup>, Officer Nathaniel Giblin initiated a traffic stop on an erratic driver. Upon contact, Officer Giblin observed signs of impairment and detected the odor of alcohol about the driver. The driver admitted to consuming alcohol and consented to sobriety testing. The driver failed all testing and refused a certified breath test. Officer Giblin requested and obtained a blood draw search warrant. The driver was transported to a medical facility where the draw was administered. Upon completion, the driver was charged and transported to jail.

On September 11<sup>th</sup>, Officer Morgan Ettenberger initiated a traffic stop on a suspected impaired driver. Upon contact, Officer Ettenberger observed signs of impairment and detected the odor of alcohol about the driver. Officer Ettenberger administered sobriety testing to the driver. The driver failed all testing and consented to a certified breath test. The driver was transported to the Brownsburg Police Department where the test was administered. Results of the test exceeded the legal limit. The driver was charged and transported to jail. The driver was additionally charged with a prior conviction of operating while intoxicated.

On September 13<sup>th</sup>, Cpl. David Shedrow initiated a traffic stop for an infraction. Upon contact, it was learned that the driver had an active warrant. Cpl. Shedrow deployed his police K9 around the vehicle. The K9 showed positive indication of narcotics in or around the vehicle. A search revealed a significant amount of suspected heroin in the vehicle. The driver admitted to possession of the heroin. The driver was charged and transported to jail.

On September 14<sup>th</sup>, Officer Mark Christian initiated a traffic stop on a vehicle that was stopped in the opposite lane of travel. Upon contact, the driver showed signs of impairment. The driver was provided sobriety testing and failed all testing. The driver consented to a certified test and was transported to the Brownsburg Police Department. The driver submitted insufficient samples on the breath test and was transported to a medical facility where a blood draw was administered. Upon completion, the driver was charged and transported to jail.

On September 18<sup>th</sup>, Officer Brad Carr responded to a report of found property on Legacy Park Drive. On arrival, Officer Carr observed several firearm shell casings in the roadway as explained by the caller. Officer Carr was approached by a person who said they heard gunshots at 7:25 a.m. that morning and observed a vehicle leaving at a high rate of speed. No other vehicle information could be provided. There was no reports of damage to vehicles or structures in the area. The scene was processed by Brownsburg CSI.

On September 23<sup>rd</sup>, Officer Megan Clonce responded to a vehicle crash on County Road 300 North. On arrival, Officer Clonce began her investigation and spoke with both drivers. One driver displayed abnormal behavior, that of a narcotics user. Cpl. David Shedrow assisted and deployed his police K9 around the vehicle. The K9 showed positive indication of narcotics in or around the vehicle. A search revealed suspected methamphetamine and drug paraphernalia. The driver was charged and transported to jail. No injuries were reported in the crash.

Additional training consisted of narcotics detection in open areas, room and vehicle searches. The following narcotics were used for search: Methamphetamine, Cocaine, Marijuana, and Heroin.

Officer Callahan Baxter has successfully completed the Experienced Officer Phase of the Field Training Program and has been recommended for solo patrol. Officer Baxter is assigned to AMA shift.

After meeting with potential Field Training candidates, Officer Eustace Mlagan and Officer Devon Craig have been chosen to fill vacancies with the Field Training Program. Both Officers are attending a Field Training Officer Course October 1-3 for their certification.

## **Use of Force**

The Brownsburg Police Department documented 18 Use of Force Reports during the month of September. The reports are classified as follows: Weaponless Physical and Firearms Pointing.

Documented reports 1-3 involved Brownsburg officers investigating an impaired driver. The driver was uncooperative with officers attempting sobriety tests. The subject resisted by tensing when officers attempted to apply handcuffs. The subject had to be physically restrained until handcuffs were applied.

Documented reports 4-6 involved Brownsburg officers searching for a missing juvenile. Upon locating the juvenile, officers attempted apply handcuffs when the juvenile attempted to pull away from officers. The juvenile had to be physically restrain the juvenile until handcuffs were applied.

Documented report 7 involved Brownsburg officers responding to a violent domestic involving a firearm. The suspect had left prior to officer arrival. The suspect returned while officers were on scene investigating the incident. One officer was outside when the suspect returned and pointed his department issued firearm at the suspect. The suspect was detained without incident.

Documented reports 8-11 involved Brownsburg officers assisting a neighboring agency looking for a suspect vehicle on the scene of a reported shooting in North Salem. Officers located the vehicle and deployed on a “high risk” traffic stop, pointing their department issued firearms at the vehicle. The driver was taken into custody without incident and turned over to the investigating agency.

Documented report 12-15 involved Brownsburg officers deploying on a “high risk” traffic stop on a suspected stolen license plate via Flock camera system. Officers pointed their department issued firearms at the vehicle and noticed the license plate number did not match the stolen license plate. The driver and passenger were released after explanation of the stop.

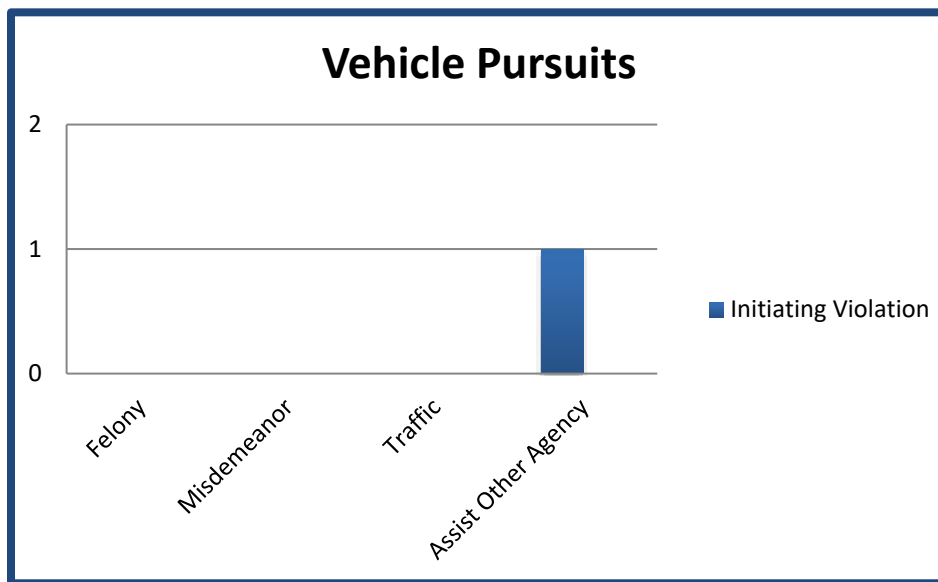
Documented report 16-17 involved Brownsburg officers locating a vehicle possibly involved in a kidnapping in a neighboring county. Officers located the vehicle and deployed on a “high risk” traffic stop pointing their department issued firearms at the vehicle. It was determined that a passenger was suffering from a mental health crisis and had to be physically restrained. The passenger was detained and transported to a medical facility for evaluation.

Documented report 18 involved Brownsburg officers responding to a report of an intoxicated person jumping into traffic and jumping on vehicles. Officers quickly located the subject who showed signs of impairment and appeared agitated. The subject asked officers to go to the hospital. Officers attempted to apply handcuffs when the subject attempted to pull away and would not comply with officer commands. The subject had to be physically restrained until handcuffs were applied.

### **Vehicle Pursuit**

The Brownsburg Police Department documented one (1) Vehicle Pursuit Report during the month of September. The chart below lists the initiating violation(s).



The single pursuit was initiated by a neighboring agency and entered Brownsburg jurisdiction traveling west on Interstate 74. Brownsburg officers assisted with the pursuit, which eventually ended on Interstate 74 when the suspect stopped and surrendered without incident.

Pursuit distance was 10 miles lasting 15 minutes. No crash or damage was reported to department vehicles.

## **Traffic**

The Traffic Unit responded to the following workflow complaints during September:

- Speeding vehicles in the area of Crossroads Elementary
- Parking violations on Phillips Drive
- Parking violations on Enderly Avenue
- Parking violations on Prelude Road
- Disregarding crossing guard and illegal u-turns in the area of BHS

The speed trailer was deployed in the Northridge Subdivision due to speeding and stop sign violations. The data for the 3-week deployment is currently being processed. Additionally, the town will be placing new stop signs throughout the neighborhood.

On September 3<sup>rd</sup>, Cpl. Dan Rooker attended PIT Instructor certification training. Additional September training consisted of State Mandates, Defensive Tactics, and Rifle Qualifications.

On September 16<sup>th</sup>, Officer Kevin Huntsman completed Rifle Qualifications.

On September 16<sup>th</sup>, Officer Dimitry Kalyuzhny completed State Mandates. On September 8<sup>th</sup>-16<sup>th</sup>, Officer Jacob Smith attended Advanced Crash Reconstruction Training. Officer Smith will be part of the department's crash reconstruction team and will respond to serious bodily injury/fatal crashes.

## **Narcotics**

On September 7<sup>th</sup>, Brownsburg Narcotics Unit (BNU) Officers traveled to Charleston, SC for the National Interdiction Conference for a week of training and networking with over 1,000 narcotics officers from around the country. The BNU also accepted an award for the largest investigative cocaine seizure in the nation in 2024 from the National Interdiction Network. This stems from a seizure made by the BNU of 1,140.6 pounds of Cocaine back in November 2024.

On September 18<sup>th</sup>, BNU Officers along with IMPD Violent Crime Unit and Violence Reduction Unit conducted a warrant service with a level 2 Felony warrant on the South side of Brownsburg. The suspect taken into custody on F2 dealing, F3 possession, F6 resisting. A search warrant of the residence was conducted and another suspect was arrested for Prohibited Felon in possession of a firearm and possession of marijuana.

Throughout the month of September, BNU Officers took part in “Operation Guardian” with the US Marshals. This was a nationwide operation in major cities across the US, targeting the most violent, wanted criminals in each city. In all, a total of over 120 violent offenders were arrested in the Central Indiana Area. The BNU worked in partnership with the USM, FBI, IMPD and several other municipal agencies. BNU assisted in several arrests during “Operation Guardian”.

Also throughout the month of September, BNU Officers assisted in the arrest of two wanted child molesters and a suspect wanted for strangulation and domestic violence.

## **Emergency Response Team**

### **Training:**

- **September 23** – ERT conducted training at the Boone County Range. The range day was led by NORSE Tactical and included handgun drills, rifle drills, transition drills and movement drills. We concluded the day making live fire entries and mitigating threats from a threshold using live fire.
  - **September 24** – ERT conducted training at the Brownsburg Training Facility Shoot house. NORSE Tactical led the training, which consisted of Close Quarters Tactics. Training emphasized breach point tactics, threat mitigation, force-on-force scenarios, and full structure clearance operations utilizing simunitions in Low Light.

**Deployments:**

- The Emergency Response Team was not deployed in September. However, a consult was made reference a suicidal subject barricaded in a burning house. ERT Operators Cpl. Koelling and Ofc. Mlagan donned re-breathers, cleared the structure, and found the subject deceased from a self-inflicted gunshot wound. Both Operators should be commended for their bravery in a very dangerous situation.

**Community Engagement**

The following Community Engagement events took place during the month of September:

On September 4<sup>th</sup>, Brownsburg officers were invited to the annual Chill and Grill hosted by Hendricks Regional Hospital at the Brownsburg Fire Territory. Officers were provided a lunch at no cost and were served by doctors, nurses, and additional hospital staff.

On September 5<sup>th</sup>, Cpt. Bullock attended a “Touch a Truck” at Indy Christian Schools Campus in Avon displaying the BPD Emergency Response Team APC. Officer Brad Carr and his K9 Trip assisted with a demo for the children to observe.

On September 8<sup>th</sup>, Brownsburg officers were invited to a luncheon at Community Rehabilitation Hospital West in Brownsburg. Several officers attended and conversed with staff and patients at the facility.

On September 18<sup>th</sup>, was one of WAWA’s grand openings in Brownsburg. Several officers participated in a hoagie building competition with Brownsburg Fire Territory. Four officers built 24 hoagies in two minutes while Fire Territory officers built 27 hoagies in two minutes. There was an official protest that the Fire Territory hoagies were inedible while the Police hoagies were amazing! Congratulations to the Fire Territory on their victory.

On September 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup>, Cpt. Bullock and Kellie Cummins attended a “Touch a Truck” event at Calvary United Methodist Church in Brownsburg with over 200 total children attending both dates. Goodies were passed out to children attending the event.

### **Reserves**

Sgt. Kim Kiritschenko has tendered her resignation after 16 years of service as a Reserve Officer for the Brownsburg Police Department. Sgt. Kiritschenko will continue law enforcement, as she is a School Resource Officer for the Danville Community School Corporation Police Department. Additionally, Kim will work part-time for the Danville Police Department. We thank Kim for her many years of service to the Town of Brownsburg.

### **Narcan**

The Brownsburg Police Department documented one (1) Narcan Usage Report during September.

Documented report 1 involved Brownsburg officers responding to an unconscious person with agonal breathing at a residence on Bruner Boulevard. The Brownsburg officer administered one dose of department issued Narcan. Brownsburg EMS arrived shortly after and administered a second dose. The person regained consciousness and was transported to a medical facility for treatment. The person admitted to ingesting an unknown pill that was purchased on the “street”.

## **Recognition**

On September 18<sup>th</sup>, several law enforcement officers from around the state were recognized at a private ceremony at Lucas Oil Stadium for their enforcement efforts. The Indiana Criminal Justice Institute recognized Officer Cody Molina for his outstanding performance in law enforcement. For the past two years, Officer Molina has led the department in impaired driving arrests. Congratulations Officer Molina on a job well done!
